
Model U.N.

Just before spring breakabout 20 students spent two days in Indianapolis participating in Model United Nations at IUPUI. Model U.N. is a program where "students across the country and around the world participate in Model United Nations, which involves substantial researching, public speaking, debating, and writing skills, as well as critical thinking, teamwork, and leadership abilities." The IUPUI summitt draws public and private schools from throughout Indiana and neighboring states. Out of several hundred competitors, two HAA students, Tony Zhao & Tatiana Babcock were recognized as Outstanding Delegates for their contributions throughout the summitt.



Science Fair

This spring seventh grade participated in the Illinois Conference Science Fair at North Shore Adventist Academy in Chicago. The class spent the day downtown presenting their posters explaining their hypothesis, experiment, and findings to a panel of judges from around the conference. Drama at PBE



LEGO Robotics

FIRST LEGO LEAGUE

On Sunday March 17, 2019 the HAA Legends of the Shooting Stars (LOTSS) LEGO Robotics team placed in the top three teams (out of a total of 11 teams) at the regional tournament of the Adventist Robotics League that took place at Kettering College and was the only Lake Union team to advance to the National Tournament held at Forest Lake Academy in Florida. This past weekend the students competed at the National tournament, besides being loads of fun, our students learn critical thinking and teambuilding skills, basic STEM applications, and even presentation skills. Space Project - the students came up with a space related problem and try to solve it. For their work on this, they received 1st place. The robots are built by the students from Lego pieces and they include a variety of electric motors and sensors. The robots are then programmed by the students to perform the different tasks completely autonomously. Robot Design - teams are judged on the design of their robot. Simplicity, durability, programming, automation, mission strategy, creativity, & efficiency are highly scored in this category. LOTSS received 1st place in this category. The teams had such a great time competing with 30 teams from all over the United States and Saipan.
